Share a teaching 'win' you've had this semester.

All of my level 2 ESL students have learned how to navigate my Canvas shell and submit homework by both sharing their google doc URL and uploading a doc.

Can you highlight support that you've received this academic year that has helped your teaching?

I'm currently in QOTL2, which started 1 day ago, and I've already had tremendous support from Andrea Fuentes. Allison Hughes gave me some great ideas to increase student-student interaction when asynchronous.

What is one strategy that you use to make your course more inclusive?

This may sound old-fashioned, but (sticking with the level 2 ESL Reading/Listening/Speaking students) we do choral/repeat in every one of my classes: I state one of the objectives for this week's lesson plan and they repeat it. We do this with the objectives, activity instructions, homework and more. This is to get the students feeling comfortable speaking loudly and proudly in class together. So, I'm not putting anyone in particular on the spot. It gives the students lots of exposure to the melody/song of the American English language, which makes its way into their language center/aural receptors. For pronunciation nuances, I sometimes back-chain, which means I start at the end of the phrase and keep adding a word until the whole phrase is complete. For example, if it's "Review active reading and annotation strategies" is the phrase, I'll go like this: "Strategies" and they repeat. Then, "annotation strategies" and they repeat. Then, "annotation strategies," etc., until we're saying the whole thing. This helps the brain focus on sound and not individual words. Somehow, it really works and they love it!

What is the biggest lesson you've learned about teaching over your career?

That everyone is trying their best. We're all coping with something. Be patient. Imagine the best in others. And we're all in this learning boat TOGETHER!

Changes to Google Cloud Assignments in Canvas

The current Google Apps LTI will be discontinued after June 30th, so as you develop your courses for Summer/ and Fall 2024 you will want to use the Google Assignments LTI moving forward. When you create an assignment, you will choose "**External Tool**" as the submission type and then choose "**Google Assignments** (LTI 1.3)" from the list, instead of Google Apps LTI. Turnitin's AI Checker is Back!

You might have noticed that the Al Checker feature in Turnitin disappeared suddenly. It has returned and the district has added it to our license, so it should be here to stay. Remember to take results from the Turnitin Al Checker with some skepticism as it does return false positives and false negatives. You can use it as a deterrent to students and as a guide for who to start an Al conversation with, but its results should not be taken as proof of plagiarism.
