

Cañada College Mission Statement:

It is the mission of Cañada College to ensure that students from diverse backgrounds achieve their educational goals by providing quality instruction in transfer and general education courses, professional/technical programs, basic skills and activities that foster students' personal development and academic success. Cañada College accepts responsibility for serving the community's diverse needs for lifelong enrichment and highly values close teacher to student teaching and learning relationships, support services and a co-curricular environment that contributes to personal growth and success for students.

Library Mission Statement:

The mission of Cañada College Library is to provide and make accessible the best possible informational, educational, cultural, and recreational materials and services to its users.



Cañada College Library Program Overview

The Library made measurable progress in achieving certain goals following its previous program review, while experiencing set backs in others. The 1997-98 goals addressed services, the collection, staffing and the level of expenditures. It is the interaction of those basic elements which set the stage for an effective library program. This program review measures library quality as it compares to state and national community college library standards. It also includes a summary of results from the Cañada College Library user survey administered in Fall Semester 1999. Although largely favorable, the survey also reveals areas of concern.

Library services are primarily offered to Cañada faculty and students. However, as a member of the Peninsula Library System, the Library serves all San Mateo County residents. Unlike our sister campuses and most public libraries, Cañada College Library offers no weekend hours. It also closes at 7:00pm Monday – Thursday, which is relatively early for a college library. The College typically hires no reference librarian during the Summer Session. However, during Summer 2000 the services of a reference librarian were secured. We encourage the college to continue funding for that service. It is anticipated that library hours will be extended when the new Library/Learning Resource Center is constructed.

The library staff provides personal assistance to patrons in satisfying their information needs. There are opportunities for individual as well as small group and class interactions. Library staffing remains well below service requirements, however, even though a full-time librarian was recently hired. Adjunct librarian hours were simultaneously reduced. Since the realm of library and information science has grown dramatically in recent years, the need for additional staffing is greater than ever. Three-year staffing goals included in this program review therefore propose an increase in certificated and classified positions.

The Library's small, aged collection is particularly inadequate for the diversity of Cañada's current population and programs. In recent years, a major emphasis was placed on systematic collection development. Generous funds from state and district chancellors' offices enabled the library to purchase several hundred books and secure access to several electronic databases. These funds primarily came from the Instructional Equipment/Library Materials Block Grant and the Technology and Telecommunications Infrastructure Program (TTIP). Although such funding may continue, it is important that the College make a commitment to ongoing library support by building stable, consistent library funding into the college planning process. The FY2001 library materials budget of \$20,133 is 69% of the \$29,150 budget allotted in FY1993. Inflation and ever expanding programs heighten the need for a larger base budget. Consequently, incremental increases in the library materials budget are recommended.

Although progress has been marginal, it is occurring. Certainly, if Cañada College intends to fulfill its mission and also serve as both magnet and anchor for the newly envisioned campus center of San Mateo County; nothing less than a dramatic shift in how it supports its Library is imperative.

Goal I: Develop information resources by providing collections that ensure current information of sufficient depth, breadth and relevance to the curriculum.

Objective A: Further expand, while also weeding periodical, pamphlet, book and video collections in selected areas: science & technology, language and literature.

Objective B: Add a full-text newspaper index on CD-ROM.

- UMI Proquest Newspaper subscriptions online began in Fall 1998
 It includes full text articles from 5 newspapers of national stature: New York Times, Washington Post, Wall Street Journal, Christian Science Monitor and abstracts from the Los Angeles Times
- In 1997 PLS began subscription to ¡Informe! (magazines in Spanish) and has since added NoveList (guide to fiction), STAT-USA (business, economics and trade information) and RAND California (information from 70 databases in the social sciences).

Objective C: Increase the number of computer workstations in order to expand student access to information resources.

- As of Fall Semester 1999 all staff and public stations are Pentium PC's with Win 95 and capable of full Internet access
- Total of 19 PC's acquired since May 1998
- Two former staff PC's converted to word processing for students
- Laser printing available from all stations

Goal II: Promote instructional and research services to patrons individually as well as in groups.

Objective A: Library staff will actively exchange program ideas in campus committees

- Curriculum Committee, Cañada Computer Committee, Associated Students and
Instruction Council.

As time permits, staff members participate in various campus, District and PLS committees. Resulting benefits include faculty recommendations of new acquisitions, opportunities for library orientations and library staff participation in campus special events.

Objective B: Develop bibliographic instruction options for Science, Language and Literature.

A one-unit course, LIBR 120 Information Competency, is currently offered. It is the outcome of a district-wide planning and implementation process which took place in 1998 during Spring, Summer and Fall semesters. This self-paced course helps students learn how to find, critically evaluate and use information in print and electronic formats. In addition, numerous classes visit the Library for one-hour orientations that prepare students to take full advantage of our resources and services.

Objective C: Create library pathfinders and orientation exercises in collaboration with faculty and Learning Center staff.

As newer resources become available, and new topics evolve, librarians develop and update various user guides. Currently there are 12 worksheets and 15 pathfinders covering various subjects that provide assistance in searching the online catalog, periodical databases and the Internet. Among the subjects included are the following: Homelessness, Careers, Asian Art for Interiors, Mexican American Culture and Early Childhood Education.

Goal III: Continue professional development opportunities for library staff.

Objective A: Provide flexible scheduling for attendance at training sessions, professional workshops and classes.

Among the professional development opportunities offered by external institutions, staff engaged in the following:

• Paul Gaskins, Senior Library/Media Technician attended annual conferences of the California Library Association and the Council on Library/Media Technicians

- Paul also completed a two-day workshop "Library Access and Assistive Technology" at the High Tech Center Training Unit of the California Community Colleges
- Part-time Librarian Kim Lim attended the 1999 Internet Librarian Conference in San Diego with the assistance of a Trustees' Grant
- Senior Library/Media Technician Daniel Matsumoto completed "OCLC Book Format", a cataloging workshop
- Daniel also attended a semester's course in Computer Graphics
- The Library Director completed two Human Resource Management courses offered through SFSU College of Extended Learning, attended the 2000 American Library Association Annual Conference in Chicago and the 2000 REFORMA National Conference held in Tucson, Arizona

Objective B: Participate in SMCCCD and PLS staff development activities.

Library/Media Technicians, adjunct librarians and the Library Director took advantage of a number of skill enhancing CTL and PLS workshops. These workshops included Banner, Microsoft Outlook, reference services, circulation services, web design and library technology. The Library Director also provided videos for staff discussion on these topics (a) sensitivity to the disabled patron (b) library security and conflict management and (c) reference/bibliographic instruction.

Objective C: Maintain institutional membership in Learning Resources Association of California Community Colleges (LRACCC) and the Council of Chief Librarians (CCL).

Library membership in these organizations remains current and the Director participates in many professional development opportunities.

Goal IV: Fill the vacant reference librarian position.

Jane McKenna became Cañada College Library's sole full-time librarian effective Spring Semester 2001. Because adjunct librarian hours were reduced correspondingly, this does not represent a staff increase. It merely returns, after seven years, some measure of stability to the program.

Goal V: Contribute to planning of remodeled and expanded library facility.

Objective A: Staff will participate in SMCCCD committees

The Library Director, both Senior Library/Media Technicians and adjunct librarians contribute to the activities related to SMCCCD Facilities Planning.

Objective B: Staff will survey library literature, attend library planning workshops and consult with knowledgeable professionals.

Using electronic library resources, library literature related to building library facilities has been retrieved and circulated to staff members. The Library also purchased American Library Association (ALA) books as a staff and college resource. In addition, the Library Director has engaged in discussions of library facilities with community college librarians and library directors and attended ALA library building workshops.

Objective C: Staff will tour at least one nearby college or public library.

The current staff has not had the opportunity to fill this objective.

#### Building concerns:

- Funds definitely need to be appropriated to the construction of a new library for Cañada. The existing library and the majority of its material are out-of-date and are in desperate need of improvements!
